Dear Parents.

I'm so proud of our pupils and staff and the work they have done this term, to build on the successes of our 2017 results. These results showed that the work we are doing to develop teaching and learning across the school is making a difference.

In the primary phase, we are introducing a new approach to the teaching of English and maths. The maths programme has already begun and on 11th December, 35 of our Year 3 children stayed after school for an extra maths lesson, which was watched by all of the primary teachers, as part of their introduction to the new programme. They had a great time - well done to the children for their enthusiasm. In the secondary phase, teachers continue to introduce the new curriculum and GCSEs. All our teachers are taking part in research, which they will apply to their own teaching. The purpose of this is to ensure that we continue to improve our results in each key stage.

We continue to work with the diocese and the local authority to prepare for our school to become an academy, but do not yet have a final date for conversion. It's a long process, but I will keep you updated.

As well as working hard, our pupils and staff have also tried to make a difference to the lives of others. We have raised money for charities and supported people in need, locally and further afield. Our pupils are also becoming more confident in leading and contributing to the spiritual life of the school. They have planned, organised and led liturgies for pupils and visitors, such as our Armistice Commemoration, attended by Bishop Ralph, governors and members of the community. Our guests were very impressed and moved by the liturgy.

Primary parents, grandparents and families joined us for the nativities in which our children did so well. They worked hard to produce very professional performances. Well done to the children, staff and parents involved.

On Friday, we say goodbye to Mrs Woodcock and Mrs Walton, whom I would like to thank for their work in Year 1 and Year 3 this term; they have given our children a great start to the year and contributed a great deal to Holy Trinity. In January, we welcome Mrs Bell, who will take Class 1 for the rest of the academic year and Mrs Gregg, who will take Class 5. Mrs Raynor will begin maternity leave in January; I'm sure you will all join me in wishing her well. Mrs Dudley, who is an experienced Year 6 teacher will take Class 11 for the rest of the academic year.

Secondary Results

Provisional National Key Stage 4 results for 2017 were recently published, so here is an update on the achievements of our most recent Year 11 leavers. We were very pleased to see significant improvement in many key areas. We were delighted to see our highest ever percentage for students achieving Maths and English at Grade 4 (equivalent to grade C) or above. This is a record result for our school, both since Holy Trinity opened AND in the history of St Michael's. In terms of numbers, it's an 8% improvement on our 2016 results. We are also very pleased that our Key Stage 4 outcomes are in line with national results in all headline areas including the new Grade 5 in English and maths and the Progress measure. This gives us an excellent basis on which to increase attainment in school even further. If you would like more information, a detailed breakdown of the results can be found on the school website.

Harvest Festival and Barnsley Food Bank Collection

For our Harvest Festival offering this year, we decided to collect much-needed items for Barnsley food bank. The response from our pupils was phenomenal – they made lots of food bags! In fact, there were so many, we had to arrange for them to be collected.

Year 9 Walk for Water

In their assemblies, Year 9 have been focussing on charity and considering those who are less fortunate.

As part of raising student awareness, they have looked at access to water in developing countries. They discovered that £85 will pay for sanitation and a toilet for a community in a low-income country.

Poor sanitation is responsible for the spread of preventable diseases, that in poor countries are incredibly dangerous to children.

In order to raise funds and give the gift of sanitation for Christmas, Year 9 have taken part in a 'Walk for Water' during their form time. Students each donated £1 and we raised £75.82, which will be doubled by the Government. The money will be sent off to help a community in need of clean water.

Bumper Crop of Holy Trinity Honey

The Holy Trinity bees have produced a bumper crop of honey this season, with around 51kg (or 113lbs). This is much higher than the recent reports of average yields of 24lbs around the country, due to our poor summer.

In addition to the honey, pupils have also been utilising the natural beeswax to make candles, blocks of beeswax for polishing and lip balm! These are being sold alongside the bestselling jars of Holy Trinity Honey.



Y9 Drama

Year 9 students looked at the effects of drugs that were once considered "legal-highs" and learned about how these drugs affect addicts.

Students used physical theatre to show the issues and effects of New Psychoactive Substances (NPS). They were able to fly, fall and fight during their lesson, whilst learning about why the government passed the Psychoactive Substances Act in May 2016.

As a group, they created physical

representations of the highs and lows addicts feel, and created a performance piece that showed how someone struggling with addictions might want to overcome their problems.

They also learned about modern street drugs such as "Spice", "Flakka", and "Black Mamba" and how the law has changed regarding these once "legal highs". Finally, they performed their piece to a recorded anecdote from a former addict who has recently overcome his issues, and is now clean.

Made in Barnsley Construction Ambassadors

Student Ambassadors involved in the Made in Barnsley programme have been on a number of visits to gain experience of the construction industry and the world of Health and social care.

The programme began in Year 9, with students having the opportunity to attend taster sessions in sectors including construction, engineering, manufacturing and healthcare. The aim is for them to gain hands-on experience of what's involved, from the perspective of people actually doing the jobs of architect, buyer, plumber, decorator, healthcare assistant, care manager, etc.

Recently, our construction





students visited a Henry Boot work site, where a care home was being constructed for people of 55 and over, who need either part or full-time care. They were able to see the amount of time and preparation that goes into a big building project.

Along with other Year 10 'Made in Barnsley Ambassadors' from Horizon Community College and Dearne ALC, our students also visited the Skills Village and attended a workshop at The Civic, where they received a thorough induction into the construction industry.

Healthcare Ambassadors visited the Mental Health Museum in Wakefield and Highgrove Care Home, where they met residents, took part in activities and visited the Dementia unit. This gave them a feel for what caring for the elderly is about. They also visited Barnsley College and had hands-on experience of working in Health and Social care.

Made in Barnsley Presentation

The Mayor of Barnsley, Cllr Jeff Ennis presented our Made in Barnsley Ambassadors with awards, in recognition of the work they have done during the first year of the programme. He also presented a surprise award to Helen Hardcastle, our Careers Advisor, in recognition of the brilliant support she has


given to students on the Made in Barnsley programme.

Special Report: Our Trip to Romania to Work With Cry in the Dark

As a faith school, helping others is a big part of the values we seek to instil in our pupils. In addition to learning and developing their skills, there are many opportunities for them to contribute to our school community, local area and further afield, supporting worthy causes.

Every year, Holy Trinity students participate in overseas projects that provide essential help to people in need. This can be assisting pilgrims in Lourdes, or working with the Cry in the Dark Charity, in Romania.

Students who travelled to Romania recently, described it as an experience they'll never forget. Here is their report, written by Isabelle and Harriet.



One country, 14 students, two teachers and an experience to never forget.

We can all remember, sitting in the hall before the summer holidays, ready to be shown a taster of what we didn't know, but would be facing right here, right now in Bacau, Romania. It was nothing compared to the reality. We arrived at Bacau airport, late afternoon, followed by a short travel to Casa Albert.

Accompanied by the wonderful Beth and Steve, who would be our tour guides for the next week, we settled in at Casa Albert after meeting their adopted loving German Shepard, Aslan, and his best buddy Bobby.

The first community we visited was Negustrului, a Roma Community, where we danced, coloured, played, painted, blew bubbles and had an overall great time with the children.

On arrival, children rushed to greet us with both hugs and kisses. Seeing someone live a completely different lifestyle to ourselves certainly opened our eyes too. But, watching children walk on the hard, rubble floor with no shoes, yet still remaining so content with what they have bewildered us all. How happy the kids were with us just being present made us extremely

delighted. So, when we left, a large majority of us felt empty.

The following afternoon, we experienced something that would stay with us forever. This was a visit to Casa Lumina which was established by Cry in the Dark. Casa Lumina means House of light, a perfect description of what we saw whilst we were there. We danced and watched the amazing people smile and have a great time right along with us. The experience left all of us with different feelings and many memories. Casa Lumina is home to a lovely group of people with a range of illnesses and needs. This

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however did not stop them from making us all smile and have an amazing time.

The second day consisted of a visit to Ungereni and Hospice Lumina. Ungereni is a state-run institution and when we visited, we all noticed a huge difference in the atmosphere compared to Casa Lumina. Tiled walls and darkness lined the corridors which ultimately made the environment feel unwelcoming and eerie. The patients, though standing at a distance, allowed you to feel their love through their smiles.

Hospice Lumina was officially opened one month ago and was built by Cry in the Dark. The

Hospice is for children who are on respite care as well as those who are terminally ill and require end of life care. The provision allows parents to rest which one of the mothers who was present greatly appreciated. Parents can stay or visit and witness their children in a loving environment where the care never stops. To see children in this way helped us appreciate the little things in

life that most, if not all people, take for granted. The specialised equipment available made us see just how much Cry in the Dark have done for these amazing children. Seeing the children smile made each of us smile right back and appreciate, even more, what we had in our lives.

Despite only being here for a few days, the memories we've made already and the things we've experienced have prompted our opinions on life as a whole. We think that this entire experience will stay close to our hearts forever.
